SAEC Van

We are super excited to have a 10 passenger van for our school. We often missed out on opportunities due to all the buses being used or having to be back in time for the regular bus runs. Now we have the freedom to schedule activities and events any time of day and even

weekends. We've already gone on some great field trips to Vancouver and the aquarium in Sidney. Hurray! We can also use the van to pick up students who could not make the regular bus run due to appointments or other constraints. This makes our education programs even more accessible for everyone!



Director's Corner - Kendra Underwood

ÍY S⊄ÁĆEL HÁLE. I hope you are all doing well. We are now a few months into our second semester and experiencing a plethora of noteworthy achievements to share in our spring newsletter. This year we have seen an increase to our student enrollment, which has led to heightened course completions as well. Our next newsletter will indicate our finalized numbers, but thus far our students have completed 25 more courses than last vear. Kudos to our students for their hard work! Furthermore, our newly established partnership with a First Nations independent school in Bella Coola has enabled us to pilot new English and math curriculum, much of which is paper-based, and has been heavily favored by students. Student appreciation for our new curriculum equates to an

average of 18 - 25 stipends going out to eligible students each pay period for 80% attendance and reasonable course progress. Onsite learners are eligible for \$50.00 a week and satellite learners are eligible for \$50.00 bi-weekly.

Our satellite programs in Tseycum and Tsawout are still running strong, and attendance has been exceptionally consistent in these outreach programs. Tseycum is now running five mornings a week from 9:00-11:00am, and Tsawout continues to run Tuesday-Thursday from 1:00-3:00pm. Thank you again to our community-based program partners for their ongoing facilitation support.

I am also pleased to share a few exciting school highlights that have come to light these past few months. In March

we applied for funding through CSETs to deliver onsite bus driver training opportunities in May. WSB/SAEC is pleased to provide funding for 6 community members to enroll in bus driver training – Class 2 and Air Brakes. Training seats will be available on a first come, first served basis, provided enrollment qualifications are met.

Additionally, we have been very lucky to have Robbie Louis begin with us in March as our on-call Language and Culture Teacher. He is now delivering language lessons on Monday mornings in Tseycum, and planning regular on-the-land learning opportunities with our onsite students.

This semester we have been fortunate to have Lindy Elliott join us once a week for a one-hour Fibres course. She is teaching students how to weave wool, and we now have a class set of looms. In May we will switch over to cedar and begin learning how to make cedar headbands and hats.



Shadi, our new certified counsellor started in February and is available each week on Tuesdays. There are 5 one-hour appointment slots each week, which are available to students in our Adult Dogwood program, as well as our onsite UVIC and Camosun programs.

We now have our very own SAEC school van! In March we acquired our new wheels, which seats 9 passengers plus the driver. We are so thrilled to have an accessible, responsive transportation option for adult learners. The van has already been used more than 25 times. Examples of van use include picking up a student that missed the bus, dropping off a student that is feeling ill midday, and for a variety of small, impromptu class field trips.

I would like to thank the WSÁNEĆ communities for their continued support of our students, staff and programming. As a community-driven school, we always appreciate the opportunity to meet with community members to seek feedback, suggestions or learn of any program needs that might exist. Clam Garden

In late January, a handful of staff and students joined Parks Canada in helping restore a traditional clam garden. We took a late day ferry to Saturna Island and set up camp on the Northwest point of the island. After a quick bite to eat, and a short rest, we gathered with our Parks Canada hosts, as well as a small group of volunteers, and drove across the island. Our hosts picked us up in two boats, and drove us across to

Tumbo Island to do our work. We arrived at Tumbo at midnight, as we needed to do the work between 1:00am and 4:00am. This was the lowest tide of the cycle, and was needed to work on as much exposed beach as possible. Our work consisted of turning over the sand of the beach with pitchforks, shovels, and garden tools to aerate it, so the clams below could get more nutrients, thrive and reproduce. It was a truly unique experience for all involved and we hope we can return for the next lowest tide to do some more work and harvest some clams.





English

Communications 12 finished in January 2019. Six students managed to finish the course, and we are proud of all of their accomplishments. Congratulations to Faith Underwood-Mosley, Janessa Voyageur, Simon James, Gail Henry, Craig Jacobs, and Taneesha Morris. Two students are currently taking LF English Level 6 to brush up their English skills. Both students are on the last assignment, having completed a great deal of work in a short period of time. As of now, 5 students have completed (or are almost complete) the 1st of 5 units in English 12 FP. We are also almost halfway through the novel Keeper and Me which is the bulk of Unit 2. Everyone is enjoying the novel.

Food Studies 12

So far in Foods we have a core group who have been working well to complete all assignments and projects. Each Monday we do theory work, Tuesdays we plan meals for the week, and Thursdays we spend the class shopping and cooking. So far we have made smoothies, salads, appetizers, and we will be making chili. All recipes are planned, budgeted, purchased, prepped and cooked during class time. We have been emphasizing thoughtfulness in budgeting and planning meals in order to encourage students to consider healthy and cost effective choices. We have so far explored some food science around nutrition and digestion. We have also looked at the evolution of Canada's Food Guide over its lifespan.



Update from Kim Linkert

Math Department

Time is absolutely flying by and we are making great progress. The math room is buzzing as students are working towards completing their courses. The new Workplace Math 11 course is very popular and most students have chosen it for their math graduation requirement. We continue to work to improve the course and add Indigenous content where we see an opportunity.



Museum Trip

We had the amazing opportunity to tour the Egypt: The Time of Pharaohs exhibit at the museum. It provided us with a snapshot of what life was like in Egypt over 3500 years ago. The exhibit had famous objects that were used by pharaohs and queens and even a 4000 year old coffin. We learned about the role that the Nile River played in the advancement of such an advanced civilization and also about the day to day life of the people. It was so amazing to see all the ancient artifacts.

IMAX

We were very fortunate to get to see The Story of Earth at the IMAX after our tour of the museum. We learned that our planet was born from dying stars and is the result of violent collisions in space. It was once a hostile sphere of molten rock that cooled and became perfect for life as we know it. This film really reminded us about how precious the earth is and that we must take care of it. Go see it if you get a chance!

Skating/Swimming/Gym

Our students really enjoy any opportunity to go to the Panorama Recreation Centre. We have a great reciprocal agreement with them and our students often workout and then jump in the pool for a swim after. It always makes for a great afternoon. We had five skating sessions this winter and once again, we saw amazing improvement by all the students that participated. It is great exercise and an activity that we hope our students will continue to pursue on their own. We are lucky to have a rink so close to our communities.



Fibre Course

We are so lucky to have Lindy Elliot popping in on Tuesday afternoons to teach us how to use looms. Our students are always craving more connection to culture and this has been a perfect opportunity. Lindy brought some looms and we built seven more to get started. We decided to start with headbands and I think we can all agree that it is much harder than it looks. It takes so much time and patience to get it right, but once you do, it is so gratifying! Thanks Lindy!

Wool Work at May Sam's

In late January, we took a group of students to visit May Sam to help wash some wool. We set up at the sinks outside, and pulled several loads from a bag to scrub and rinse. Next we spread the wool out on drying racks so it could be carded for later use. It was wonderful to spend time outside, on a brisk afternoon, working together. We also enjoyed being able to repay May for all the wonderful work she does for our school and students.
















Update from Diane Kirby

What a great bunch of people in our Tseycum Satellite Cohort! Our program is now 5 mornings a week. Mondays are SENCOTEN with Robbie Louis; Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday are English and Math with Diane Kirby and Ang Hamilton and Friday is Art 12 with Caroline Stengl. Students are doing work from foundational courses up to grade 12. Our goal is to help people start where they are and help them reach educational goals for post-secondary, high school graduation, trades programs and life. We do vocabulary builders (spelling tests) and math minutes just for fun!



And we do have fun. Attendance is great and we usually have eight to twelve students in attendance and sometimes some children, too.



Being in Tseycum makes it easier for people who are working, have children, have mobility issues and cannot get to our main campus full-time. We have had a number of students move up to SAEC from our little portable and they are having success.

I do have to thank Xavier Jack and Roz Tanner-Jack for starting the movement to have school in Tseycum and supporting us. We are looking forward to the new home being prepared for the program. It helps support a solid learning environment from preschool to adult learning and training. Kudos to Tseycum!

Playing Card Flashcards

It's time to play with the kids. For this easy one you can use ordinary playing cards. Adding and subtracting the numbers you or your child flashes at you can be fun. You can work up to multiplying but make sure YOU know your times table or print one out. The fastest way is to take out all the face cards and just use the ace to 10 cards. Hold up two cards and say add these. For example 8 plus A(1) is 9. Or 8 minus 1 is 7.

You can give as much time as you want or limit it to 5 seconds. If you are doing subtraction, make sure the big number is on your left. It can be a great way to learn together without having to write anything down!

The other one is play Highest, Lowest. Divide your cards up by how many players there are. Ace is still equal to 1 and if you use face cards the Jack is worth 11, The Queen 12 and the King 13. Children learn fast which number is higher. The dealer puts down a card and everyone puts one in front of themselves that is higher. The highest card gets all of them and sets them to the side. The winner gets to call "Highest" or "Lowest" and lays down a card everyone has to do what they said. Eventually everyone may lose all their cards but its fun to try.





Health and Wellness Update from Ang Hamilton

Spring has arrived and I hope you are loving the sunshine that it brings. I am overturning the community gardens and getting ready to plant a spring summer garden. This year one of the garden beds will be dedicated to traditional plants and medicines. The other beds will be vegetables for our lunch program. This school year I have been working in Tseycum alongside Diane
Kirby with our statelite program. It has been wonderful to be in the
community, getting to know community members and students. I have had great help in the kitchen from Alvin
to make this all possible. He helps prepare the salad bar, and does an amazing job.

One of the programs we have offered this year is a Good Food Box Dinner. We started with a Food Challenge party to introduce the program. We had a variety of foods for each group of students and staff to create a yummy dish with. Some of the foods for the creations were fruits and veggies. We are very proud to announce that the second cohort of our W,SENĆOŦEN IST (Moving the language forward through the breath of the people) Diploma of Indigenous Language Revitalization is well into its second semester! W,SENĆOŦEN IST is a diploma program in Indigenous Language Revitalization in partnership with the University of Victoria. Over two years, students are engaging in language acquisition skills in the context of language

revitalization, while at the same time preparing for a broad range of further academic paths.

Currently, students are registered in four courses including: Intro to SENĆOŦEN Indigenous Language II (IED 159), WSÁNEĆ Art and Language (IED 187), Self-Directed Immersive Language Learning (IED 156) and (Ling 181) Introductory Linguistics for Language Revitalization.

We are very proud of our new cohort of learners who complete in June 2020 and will find jobs working in our immersion school and infusing language into our communities. If you are interested in joining us, or want more information, please contact Tye Swallow at the school.

As part of any language

revitalization journey, I strongly recommend visiting other successful language revitalization initiatives. The Hawaiians have been leading in the area of immersion schooling for close to 35 years and as such WSÁNEĆ and SENCOTEN was proudly represented with 9 W, SENĆO TEN IST students, 3 WSB staff and 2 Tsawout members visiting the Hilo Field Study attached to the ICLDC 2019 event. As our SENĆOŦEN Immersion stream at the WSB has been significantly inspired by what we have witnessed and learned from the Hawaiians, we gifted these Hawaiian Koi wood panels to the Nāwahīokalani'opu'u School, Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani College of Hawaiian Language and to Larry Kimura a language revitalization guru.






Art Update from Caroline Stengl

Students began their exploration of drawing by creating ink line drawings for a colouring book. I will be creating a printed and bound colouring






Songs of S,DA,YES - Ptarmigan Music Day

A special music performance was brought to our school by the Ptarmigan Society on January 29th. The Songs of S,DA,YES suite of music was composed by Ben McConchie. The music is about an important story from 1863, part of the history of Pender Island that forever changed how settlers and indigenous communities related to each other. The story of these historic events gives insight into the conflicts and ongoing relationship between the First Nations people and non-Native people living on the traditional territory of the STÁUTW (TSAWOUT) people on S,DA,YES (Pender) Island. The music was performed by a large ensemble of Pender Island community members including Pender Island Jazz Band, Pender Island Youth Orchestra, Ben McConchie and Lauren Mann. The performance was opened by OCM (Our Culture Matters), a drum group from STAUTW First Nation led by Romaine Underwood. The performance included projected images of paintings and photographs to give a beautiful visual component to the story telling. The concert was attended by the SAEC, the high school, ŁÁU, WELNEW elementary school students, WSÁNEĆ community members and elders. It was a beautiful musicial performance and

brought many people together in a good way. We are very thankful to the Ptarmigan Society and the Pender island musicians who brought their talents to our school to share with us! We hope this is the beginning of a productive and positive partnership with Ptarmigan Society, a non profit arts organization that brings arts programming to the gulf islands region and beyond.




